KidzMaker™ Adorable Scarf Knitting Kit

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


A. CONTENTS


3 spools of yarn, a 6-pronged knitting reel, an 18-pronged knitting reel, a crochet needle, a pair of plastic needles and detailed instructions. The finished scarf is around 100 cm long.

B. MAKING THE ANIMAL BODY


The scarf is composed of tube-shaped knitwork, topped with added embellishments. The technique used is basic French knitting. You may reuse the same tools and the same technique to make your own creations, such as dolls, bracelets, mini pillows, ornaments, etc.




- 1. The first two rows of yarn form the base of your knitting work, and require a special technique. Cut a 450-cm length of white yarn and start from the prong with a circle marked next to it. Wind the yarn once around the knitting reel in an "alternate prong" pattern, as shown in the diagram. Leave a loose end of about 10 cm and place it through the middle of the reel.
- 2. Wind the yarn through a second round, forming a complete circle this time. You will see that the two rows of yarn are now overlapped in an "alternate prong" pattern, as shown in the diagram.
- 3. Use the crochet hook provided. At the prong where two strands of yarn overlap, lift the bottom loop over the top.
- 4. Hook it through the prong.
- 5. Repeat the same process for all the alternate prongs, until all the prongs with overlapping yarn are done.
- 6. The base is now completed and will look like the one shown in diagram 6.




- 7. Take the loose end and wind the yarn around the reel to form a complete circle.
- 8. Lift the bottom loop over the top and hook it, as in step 3. Repeat with ALL other prongs.
- 9. Keep winding and knitting until you have almost finished that entire length of white yarn. Take out the orange yarn, cut a 300-cm length and set it aside for a later step. Use the orange yarn left over to tie a double knot at the end of the white yarn and continue winding and knitting until that length of orange yarn is almost used up.
- 10. Next, continue to knit using a 300-cm length of white yarn, a 300-cm length of orange yarn (cut and set aside during Step 9) and lastly another 300-cm length of white yarn. Knot to connect the differently-coloured yarn. Please note: Do not wind the yarn too tight, as this will hinder knitting. Always gently pull down your knitwork when knitting. This will help properly maintain the shape of your knitwork.
- 11. CASTING OFF: After you have finished the pattern at Step 10, leave a length of about 60 cm. Use the sewing needle to thread the yarn through the loop at each prong as shown.
- 12. Release your work from the reel and pull one end of the yarn to close one side of the knitwork. Your animal's scarf body is done!



1. Cut a 20-cm length of brown yarn and set it aside. Cut a 200-cm length of brown yarn and start to wrap all of this yarn around your fingers. 2. Carefully slip the yarn off your fingers. If you don't overhandle it, your yarn bundle should stay together. Wrap the bundle using the 20-cm length of yarn, tie a knot in the middle, and then tie another knot in back. 3. Finish your pom pom by trimming it into the shape of a ball. Your animal's nose is now done.



1. To use this 6-pronged knitting reel, employ the same knitting methods used for steps C1-C12. It is a mini version of the 18-pronged knitting reel. To make an animal ear, first cut a 150-cm length of brown yarn, leaving a loose end of about 10 cm placed through the middle of the reel. 2. Start from the prong with a circle marked next to it, wind the yarn once around the knitting reel in an "alternate prong" pattern, as shown in the diagram. 3. Now wind the yarn around a second time, this time forming a complete circle. You will see that the two rows of yarn now overlap at alternate prongs. 4. Use the crochet needle provided. Start at a prong where the two rows of yarn overlap. 5. Lift the bottom loop over the top one, and hook it through the prong. Repeat until all three alternate prongs with overlapping yarn are done. 6. The result will look like this. You have completed the base for the knitting. 7. Take the loose end and wind the yarn around the reel to form a complete circle. 8. Lift the bottom loop over the top and hook it, just as you did in steps E4 & E5. Repeat with the ALL other prongs. Keep winding and knitting until the yarn is almost used up. 9. Tighten your work by pulling the yarn that hangs under the knitting tool. Do not to pull the yarn too tight, or you will not be able to knit. Check your knitting by removing the knitting tool's handle. 10. CASTING OFF: After you have almost finished the yarn, leave a length of about 20 cm. Use the sewing needle to thread the end through the six loops, as shown in the diagram. 11. Release your work from the knitting tool. Hold the end of the yarn and pull it tight. The animal ear is done. Repeat steps E1-E11 to make another ear. 12. Cut 4 370-cm lengths to make 4 legs, and follow the same steps from E1-E11.




Tie the pom pom to the scarf end to make a nose and two ears on head. Then use the following stitches to make the eyes and connect the legs.

Stem Stitch

This stitch is great for curvy lines such as vines and plant stems. We will use it mainly for outlining.





Satin Stitch

The satin stitch is a long, flat embroidery stitch, giving the appearance of satin.
